NATURE NOTES 59

Buttercups, formerly also known as Butterflowers or Goldcups, come from a surprisingly large family, with such diverse members as Old Man's Beard *Clematis*, Rue *Thalictrum*, Delphiniums and Hellebores. Among the yellow, buttercup-like flowers we have in Easton, there is also the common Creeping Buttercup, tall Meadow Buttercup and Bulbous Buttercup with its sepals turned down below the petals. Then there is Celery-leaved Buttercup, which grows in the Brook, Lesser Celandine, one of the earliest plants to flower, and the dainty Goldilocks recently found in the 'new footpath' spinney near the Treatment Works. This month, too, some ponds have been partly covered by the white, aquatic buttercup known as Water Crowfoot. The allied Marsh Marigold or Kingcup, on the stream bank near Ford Cottage, was introduced by the Hallidays some 6 or 7 years ago, and new plants have now become established down to the footbridge opposite Brook House. Though rare naturally in Huntingdonshire, it paints whole meadows yellow in Upper Teesdale in late May.
