## NATURE NOTES NO. 115



I found this lovely little Goldilocks buttercup growing in the elm spinney with the path running through it towards the Treatment Works. I have never seen it growing in Easton before, but it is easily overlooked. You can recognise it by its small flowers, often missing a petal or two, and its whorl of narrow stem leaves. This makes the fourth kind of buttercup growing in Easton, the more common Meadow, Creeping and Bulbous buttercups appearing a little later. Close cousins, such as Lesser Celandine and Marsh marigold have been lighting up the sides of the Brook for some time now with their golden flowers, but this other tiny little member of the family, Mouse tail, is quite a rarity. I spotted it this time last year growing on the edges of the little muddy pond behind the first old



oak tree up the Spaldwick track. The record duly appeared in the annual report of the Hunts Fauna & Flora Society as the County Recorder's “favourite record of the year... and only the second location in the last 20 years”. It gets its name from the seed head in the centre of the five petals, which elongates as it matures – like a mouse's tail, *Myosurus*, to Latin buffs.
