I followed a little while later to take our dog for a walk and was surprised to find a Highway Maintenance truck parked at the entrance to Hartham Street! I parked next to the lorry and

the driver explained that they were beginning to work on the by-way, leaving the contents of their three trucks that day and returning with more materials over the next few days. I began to walk along the track and met another workman who said they'd also be working overnight, when all the hardcore had been delivered, until the path was restored.

Hartham Street was last resurfaced in 2009, when Brian Davis notes that gates were installed to prevent vehicular use in wet weather. Unfortunately, over the years, the path had degraded to such an extent that it was almost unusable by walkers, cyclists and drivers. Now, however, the hardcore has been deposited from just beyond the metal gate nearest Easton and stretches almost all the way to the bottom of the hill up to Grafham. Those of us who have enjoyed this walk in the past can now do so again - without the risk of a sprained ankle or worse!!

BRIAN JOLLY 28.11.48 - 28.05.20

Brian, who was often known as Joe, was buried in Easton churchyard on Thursday, 18th June. His parents moved to Easton in 1954 and he was the second youngest of six children - he had two sisters and three brothers. He attended Spaldwick school and St. Peter's in Huntingdon. As a young man, he helped out by driving tractors on Sid Rowlatt's farm in the village. He then worked as a lorry driver for Bedfordia in Ellington for ten years before working for the family firm, Jolly Brothers, where he drove his own vehicle for 35 years.

His great interest was stock car racing – spectating and working on machine maintenance. He passed on this enthusiasm to his son Guy, whom he fitted out with his own stock car when he was 18. The presence of three stock cars parked on the verge outside the church at his funeral testified to his passion for the sport.

Members of the Jolly family were involved in the life of Easton village for many years until the family house was sold in 2018. Brian was a kind man who was always willing to help others in any way. His funeral was well-attended despite the Covid-19 restrictions and the wet weather. He will be very much missed by his family and many local people.
