

What a season of mellow fruitfulness we are having in our orchard this year, the boughs bent with apples, full of ripeness to the core – as Keats so aptly put it. This picture shows the fruit of four trees planted perhaps in the late 19th century, since all their trunks were already hollow in 1972 when we first came here nearly 50 years ago; those we ourselves have planted show no such signs of age. Top left and top right are two old varieties, Early Victoria and Emneth, named for us by a Monks Wood colleague, Ian Newton, who kept an orchard of unusual varieties. The former are lovely cooking apples but two of the original old trees have died and one has a single surviving branch so we have planted two more, propagated for us from grafts at



Riverside Nurseries a few years ago. The Emneth was obviously produced around the village of that name near Wisbech, close to where Ian lived. The apples top centre are beautiful and make good jelly, but too sharp to eat or cook. We wonder whether old Dick Parnell made cider from them! Below these three apples is a pear and a 'crab-pear' produced by vigorous young trunks growing from the original – presumably wild – rootstock. The 'cultivated' pears are hard and not juicy and now appear at the tops of two old trees some 15 to 20 feet high so are unobtainable, while the crab-pears hang like golf-balls in dense clusters until they fall and cover the ground. This bounty must help to support Blackbirds and Fieldfares in winter, but also the population of rabbits that dig holes everywhere in the orchard. Old Dick would have lived on the natural productivity of this garden, supplemented by a few chickens, and herrings from the market.

'BATTLE' OF HUNTINGDON REVEALED IN NEW EXHIBITION

An invading army arriving in Huntingdon, looting households and taking away hostages including the town's Mayor may seem far-fetched, but did really happened 375 years ago last month. A new exhibition, at the Cromwell Museum in Huntingdon, looks at what happened when the Civil War reached the area in 1645. There will be some rarely seen artefacts displayed for this exhibit, including a newspaper from 1645 relating the story of the occupation, and bullets excavated during the recent A14 archaeological digs which may come from this period.

The 'Battle' of Huntingdon exhibit opens at the Cromwell Museum on Saturday 29 August and will run until 15 November during normal Museum opening hours. Subject to the latest Covid restrictions, the Museum is open Tuesday – Saturday from 11am – 4pm, with admission free of charge. A possible half-term activity?

CHURCHYARD GATE

Have you noticed that the old churchyard gates, crippled with age, have been returned, beautifully reconstructed? They were part of the church restoration of 1869-1903 by John Ladds and Inskip Ladds, the church architects. Inskipp Ladds probably designed them as his drawings are in the Norris Museum, St Ives. The plan is to rebuild more of the churchyard wall which was begun some years ago, and which continues to be funded by donations given by families and friends to the church in the Easton Church Fabric Fund.
