### **Farmer Burton's Country Talk**

I am pleased to say that since my last newsletter we drilled our Winter Wheat into almost perfect seedbeds, in mid-October. This was closely followed by a



pre-emergence herbicide that was sprayed within days of the wheat being drilled. This will help control the weeds as they come through the soil surface. With the mild weather that followed, the Wheat now looks really quite

well.

We have also been very brave and bought a new, well new to us (in fact it's 15 years old!) sprayer for the farm. I never like change and get quite attached to my old kit (no Jill, I'm not talking about you!), but James and I took the decision to upgrade. Now, I don't want to get too technical, but if I push a few buttons on the inbuilt GPS computer it will spray the headland and when I start going up and down the field tramlines, it will automatically switch on and off at each end! I know, it's run on Windows XP, but it blows my mind! We haven't gone down the auto steer route yet, I don't think I could work that one out, thank God I've got James to help me on the tech stuff!

In the news, farmers and Labour MP's have issued a fierce last-minute warning demanding urgent changes to the proposed 'family farm tax' amid warnings that it will devastate small working farms who are already working on razor thin margins. A large demonstration will take place in London on Budget Day. By the time you read this the Budget will have been announced (and I think we are all dreading the outcome).

Only this week the Government announced that it's Brexit reset will put half of the herbicides used in Britain under threat.

## Stitching the Nation: Fashion in Times of Turmoil Charles Nixon



A baby's gown, a pair of gloves, a purse and an original set of lady's corsets... these are all some rare surviving items of 1600s clothing that have gone on display as part of a new exhibition at Huntingdon's Cromwell Museum. These items have been kindly loaned to the Museum from private collections and other museums and have been rarely seen

in public – some reputedly having belonged to Cromwell himself. They are now on show as part of a new exhibit.

The new exhibit examines how clothing changed through the 1600s, often influenced by French fashions as well as religious restrictions and the necessities of the brutal Civil War in the 1640s. It shows how many of the fashions we associate with the Restoration court of Charles II, including silk dresses, long men's coats and wigs, were already being worn at the Protectorate court of Oliver Cromwell. Some of the items have been kindly loaned to the museum by one of Cromwell's descendants which have been passed down the family over the last 350 years, including a lace collar and pair of beautifully tooled gloves said to have been worn by Cromwell and an infant's gown reputed to have been worn by him as a baby.

The 'Stitching the Nation: Fashion in Times of Turmoil' exhibit is open during regular opening hours at the Cromwell Museum (open Tuesday – Sunday) until 12 April 2026. Admission is free of charge.
